Topics We'll look at the major approaches to scientific explanation, with special attention to issues about high-level explanation as they arise in equilibrium models, statistical models, black-boxing models, and "distinctively mathematical" explanations. We'll also look at the place of natural kinds in the science, and some issues about scientific categories (biological sex, species, etc.) more generally.

Evaluation Your total grade will be determined by two 4000–5000 word papers, equally weighted.
